


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# Dordogne & The Lot: Full-color Travel Guide To The Dordogne & Lot (Footprint - Destination Guides)



## Synopsis

There's an inviting cuisine based on duck, foie gras and truffles, and lovely villages of warm golden stone that complement some of France's most civilized landscapes.

For those who want a guide to drill down to the next level, esp ancient history & 'connections', of this (in the case of the Lot) relatively off the tourist track area...which is spell-binding. There are lots of us who consider this one of the great regions of rural France, and part of what makes it so spell-binding is that there are multiple layers of history (not just 'ancient': like a still-in-use Art Deco 1920's service station in a village on the Aveyron), like a Grand Canyon, pretty much around every bend. This is the book to have with you. An old girlfriend taught: don't plan too many things, a couple main goals, but have the right reading material along (whatever that may be...river guides, fishing spots, menhirs, histories of 15th century France, wineries). This is the right reading material. I started in Cadogan Guides with Scotland, been there 18 times, and still *\*always\** take that Cadogan. This books is the same: indispensable, even if you think you know the region, and enough practical info about everything (french) so you could use it for a first trip to France if you want to go to a beautiful, peaceful region packed with secrets and history.

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
