

Dr. Paul Pimsleur devoted his life to language teaching and testing and was one of the world's leading experts in applied linguistics. After years of experience and research, Dr. Pimsleur developed The Pimsleur Method based on two key principles: the Principle of Anticipation and a scientific principle of memory training that he called "Graduated Interval Recall." This Method has been applied to the many levels and languages of the Pimsleur Programs.

This is the last set (currently) of the Pimsleur Japanese language program. Each track is roughly 30 minutes long and starts out with reviewing some of the words and phrases that you previously learned and then continues on to new ones. Some words will be for casually speaking and others will be for politely speaking. There is a total of 30 tracks in each set and it is recommended that only 1 track is completed each day. It is not a bad way to start learning Japanese although your language skills will not be exceptional upon completion. You would be able to have a very light conversation with someone by the end of the series and that would be at best. The worst part that I have noticed about this program is that after you learn how to say some phrases and words a couple of different ways (speaking casually and politely), you are sometimes told to say that phrase it is not always specified in which manner to say it in. So when the track repeats back to you, it may not be how you said it even though it may still be correct.

This is a good albeit \$\$\$ way to drill basic grammar and speaking. I used this to review for JLPTN4 and it served that purpose well. You'll need to use a solid text like Genki I-II or "Japanese For Everyone" for more in-depth grammar and voc. In Pimsleur III you're still learning easy words like "nimotsu" and "deguchi." Stuff like this should've been taught in Pimsleur I IMHO. Grrr. Sample sentences include:"Tanaka can't attend the meeting.""Their office moved to the Shinjuku

building""Wont you have a seat?""The meeting went well."I pop a Pimsleur III CD in while doing housework and learn by "osmosis" so it's very convenient.

I have used Pimsleur materials and find them very useful. I spoke Japanese many years ago, and this is a great review tool. I would also like to praise the people I bought it from, Language Secrets. They got the set to me very fast, it was in beautiful condition, one of those special editions in fact, and the price was low for what I got. To start with, I recommend this product. I can't write worth anything but I have a decent ear so this series fits me perfectly - everything is by ear. I find it especially useful with my hectic schedule because I can use my otherwise wasted comuting time in the car. In the blurb about the course it says that the lessons should be listened through in one go without interuption but I have found that it doesn't matter much if I stop (my comute is only 15 minutes) and continue on the way back. It seems the vocabulary is too limited to get me over the threshold where I can start to pick up the languge on my own.

This particular series (Jap III), seems to be geared toward the individual that might find themselves being transferred to Japan for a short stint. Lots of shigoto-ga this and that. Dealing with going to meetings, after work parties, etc. But lemme tell yaÃ¢Â¢Ã ¬Ã Â|if you DO find yourself at a Japanese company meeting with only this program as your prep; you are gonna be lost! I, like others were a bit disappointed with the series in general. In all fairness to Pimsleur,Ã¢Â¢Ã ¬Ã Â|this language is tough, and not by any stretch of the imagination would anyone claim its a piece of cake. And equally as difficult to condense this

extremely sophisticated language into 48 hrsÃ¢Â€Â“ I'm sure. Spanish, ItalianÃ¢Â€Â“ walks in the park. JapaneseÃ¢Â€Â“ (and I have a Jap wife - who marginally helps me); learning this is a rough endeavor! If you want to learn this language, you NEED to live there; learn the dialect of your region. Otherwise, you'll always be to the Japanese, "Oh look at the Gai-jin; isn't it cute how he mangles the language?" My closest Japanese friend told me once, "Go move to JapanÃ¢Â€Â“ and in 20 years, you'll be fluent."

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
