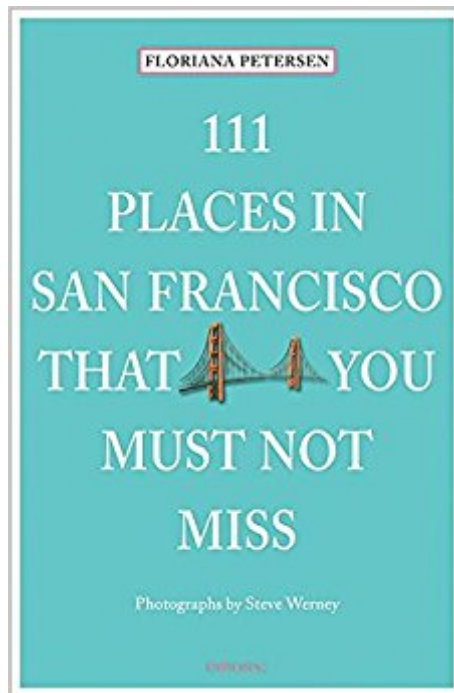




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# 111 Places In San Francisco That You Must Not Miss

Floriana Petersen is an accomplished interior designer with a background in art history. Her beloved city of San Francisco – with its eclectic style, never-ending capacity for reinvention and contagious joie de vivre – inspires her work and fuels her creativity.

I've lived in the Bay Area for most of my life and purchased this book to learn about eccentric historical facts and locales within San Francisco, in preparation for a scavenger hunt in the city. I feel like this book is perfect for locals or people who are already VERY familiar with the major SF tourist sites AND city neighborhoods, and who will have many weeks/months/years/the time to explore the city's off-the-beaten-path sites. If you're looking for a visitor's guide book that will cover the major sightseeing attractions, this is NOT the book for you. For example, this book does not cover the Golden Gate Bridge, the Palace of Fine Arts, Fisherman's Wharf, nor Coit Tower; nor does it give any high-level summary about the different neighborhoods within the city. This book is written with the assumption that you're already familiar with all of that already. If it's your first week (or even month) in SF, I would highly recommend going with a different city guide book first, so you can become better acquainted with San Francisco before coming to this book, as this one seems like it would be much better appreciated by those who are locals. From a Bay Area native's point of view- I really love this book! I like how there are pictures for every site mentioned (the picture page faces the page of each site's story), and I get a real kick reading up on the history of each site. The blurbs are memorable and well-written, and I like that they aren't too long to read. It's a nice plus that public transit lines are listed for each location. Additionally, the map at the back of the book, which includes markers for each of the places mentioned in the book, could be helpful to use for planning a trip around the city... or to plan a little fun sightseeing detour if you're, say, going out to dinner and happen to be close to some of the sites mentioned in the book.

The book is conveniently sized (5.25" x 8") to be carried about, and has a page of text and a facing page picture of each featured place. The 111 places are arranged in alphabetical order, from "140 New Montgomery" to "Wood line". At the beginning there is a table of contents with title and one-line description of the place. Even more useful are the four maps at the end of the book with the numbers of the places shown. One can identify clusters of places to visit on a single outing. Many of my favorites such as #40 Fort Funston, #57 Land's End, #71 Moraga Street step, and #110 "wave organ" are covered, but some are not such as the "Wind harp" in South San Francisco and Bay Model in Sausalito. But then someone has to pick the "111" items to feature. This is an excellent book to use to plan an outing to San Francisco.

I found the book to contain places I would definitely want to miss. For instance, the 6th out of 111th places is 'The Vibrator Museum'. Others include secretive gentlemen club, etc... No, they're not all sex stops, but this is not something I would expect to see in a tourist book. The book is well made and does have pictures for each stop. Yes, including a picture for #6.

This is one that even locals can appreciate--I'm one of the few born & raised here, and I've been learning all sorts of interesting factoids about my City.
